Greetings everyone,

Looking to run an elective course in the spring (Weather 09 is the leading candidate).







Rules to Live By By Jack Kurrus, SN



In this issue we continue to review the Rules of the Nautical in Part C Lights and Shapes, looking at Rules 24, Towing and Pushing. But because this is a rather lengthy Rule so we will break it into two parts and look at the second half next month. This Rule 24 is a very important rule to be well versed in if you're doing any night sailing. Back in 1987 a 30' - 40'motor yacht, named the "Karen E "came to

grief while crossing the Sound at night near Plum or (a)(ii), two masthead lights in a Gut. Apparently the Karen E. crossed behind a large tug in tow, going across the submerged catenary of the tow cable not knowing there was a large barge following. Several people lost their lives in this tragedy. It was clearly a case where the Skipper of the Karen E didn't recognize the tow lights carried by the tug boat.

Rule 24 Definitions Note: International and Inland Rule 24 virtually the same. Inland Rules differences will be included in

bold italics.

- (a) A power driven vessel when towing shall exhibit:
- (i) Instead of the light prescribed in Rule 23(a)(i) or (a)(ii), two mast head masthead lights in a vertical line. When the length of the tow, measuring from the stern of the towing vessel to the after end of the tow exceeds 200 meters, three such lights in a vertical line:
 - (ii) sidelights;
 - (iii) a sternlight;
- (iv) a towing light in a vertical line above the Note: Sources for this article were: sternlight;
- (v) when the length of the tow exceeds 200 meters, a diamond shape where it can best be seen.

- (b) When a pushing vessel and a vessel being pushed ahead are rigidly connected in a composite unit they shall be regarded as a power driven vessel and exhibit the lights prescribed in Rule 23.
- (c) A power-driven vessel when pushing ahead or towing alongside, except in the case of composite units, shall exhibit:
- (i) instead of the lights prescribed in Rule 23(a)(i)


vertical line;

- (ii) sidelights;
- (iii) a sternlight. Inland (iii) Two towing lights in a vertical line.
- (d) A power-driven vessel to which paragraph (a) or
- (c) of this Rule shall also comply with Rule 23 (a) (ii).

Please take time to look up the illustrations of these lights in your copy of the Rule of the Nautical Road book. These are really a must know for all sailors who sail on after sundown. While there are many more light combinations these lights described here are the ones your most apt to see at the Eastern end of Long Island Sound where we all sail.


